KITCHEN FIRE DISPLACES MULTIPLE RESIDENTS

Marysville, WA – Marysville Fire District responded to a structure fire at Harmony House Apartments in Marysville at approximately 9:00pm on Monday, March 30th.

Crews arrived to find flames in a second-floor apartment kitchen, with extension into the attic space. Firefighters worked quickly to contain the fire and prevent further spread throughout the building. A resident was able to act quickly by using a fire extinguisher while neighbors called 911. Their quick actions and familiarity with how to use the extinguisher played an important role in limiting the damage to the building.

All 14 residents and their pets were safely evacuated, and no injuries have been reported. Damages to the apartment complex were estimated at over \$100,000

Marysville Fire District would like to thank the Marysville Cold Weather Shelter and the American Red Cross for assisting displaced residents with temporary housing and support.

We also extend our appreciation to Everett Fire Department, Marysville Police Department, Snohomish County 911, and the Snohomish County Fire Marshal's Office for their assistance at the scene.

Marysville Fire District reminds residents of the importance of having a fire extinguisher readily available in the home and, more importantly, knowing how to use it. In the event of a small fire, a properly used extinguisher can help stop it from spreading. Remember PASS: **P**ull the pin, **A**im at the base of the fire, **S**queeze the handle, and **S**weep side to side.
